

From the President's Vest

In December, my wife Megan and I were fortunate enough to spend a few days in the Bahamas, fishing for Bonefish. The experience was incredible, and I'd recommend it to anyone that gets the opportunity. Those Bones are aggressive and they love to run. However, it was a stark reminder of the value of habitat, and what it means to lose it. The Bahamas were crushed in 2019 by Hurricane Dorian, and it was obvious that the fishery hasn't yet returned to its former glory. Many a shoreline are covered by acres of dead mangrove trees – a key component of Bonefish habitat. Efforts are underway to restore the mangroves, though there's a lot of work to be done. Within the Muddy Creek watershed, we're



blessed with some incredible habitat for fish, and my trip served as a good reminder as to why we Conserve and Protect.

I'm Muddy proud of the great work that the chapter continues to engage in. Another season of our streamside incubator program recently concluded – an effort to grow the wild trout population in the watershed. As you read this, school children are sitting next to tanks of developing Rainbow Trout – an effort that we sponsor to educate youth on the lifecycle of a trout and the importance of clean, cold water (Trout in the Classroom or *TIC*). Our Cabin Fever Fly Tying event was an incredible success. It was a great fundraiser for the chapter, but even more than that it was great to engage with fellow anglers from multiple local organizations. In March, we have an opportunity to treat *The Hemlocks* that overhang the lower end of the FFO stretch, to protect them from woolly adelgid. In April, we'll host another event to introduce women who may be new the sport and the cause – an effort to bring more diversity to the fly fishing and the chapter. And a crew of volunteers is already busy stocking the watershed in waters where trout don't otherwise hold over well.

We may not be facing the devastation of a hurricane, but there's still an incredible amount of opportunity to make an impact. It's important work, and I'm proud to serve alongside you.

INCUBATOR REPORT

I am excited to report another successful year is in the books for our incubator project at TU Chapter 575. We received 100,000 eyed brown trout eggs from PA Fish and Boat Commission Huntsdale Hatchery on November 21, 2022. The eggs were placed in our incubators at four locations near spring heads in the Muddy Creek watershed. We began to see hatching activity right after Thanksgiving. The trout

spend a few weeks in the sack fry stage while they are sustained by their yolk sac. Once consumed, the fry gets hungry and becomes a "swim-up". They begin to look for additional sustenance and are directed to a standpipe at the discharge of the incubator and find there way into the Muddy Creek Watershed. They live in small tributaries until they are approximately three inches in length. At that point they are ready to join the rest of the bigger trout and move down stream into the larger water in Muddy Creek. We estimate the survival rate at about 85% for this years program. I would like to thank all of the volunteers for their time and good work as we continue improve the fishing experience in to our watershed by increasing the number of wild trout that live in Muddy Creek. 
ADVOCACY FOR SPENCER RUN CULVERT REPLACEMENT

On February 7th, a small group of MCTU volunteers and an interested landowner attended the Lower Chanceford Township Supervisor's meeting to advocate for the replacement of the culvert on Piney Hill Road, at the Spencer Run crossing. Funding is available to the township for the replacement of the culvert, and we believe that the township should pursue the project, for the following reasons:

Benefit to the Community: The style and age of the culvert are of such that a high water event would likely wash it out, leaving the road impassable until the permits and funding could be obtained to have it replaced. Proactive replacement of the culvert would ensure that Piney Hill Rd would be closed for a much shorter period of time in comparison.

Benefit to Trout: The culvert exists as a barrier to fish that try to access the cooler waters of Spencer Run to protect themselves from the high temps of Muddy in the summer months, and to access Spencer Run for spawning purposes. Reconnecting the stream would yield a significant benefit to the wild trout population.

Benefit to Water Quality: The culvert is currently to blame for Gully Erosion, a type of erosion that occurs when a stream bed is unnaturally altered to support this style of culvert. As such, significant erosion and sedimentation continues to impact the water quality in Muddy Creek.



Fortunately, the York County Conservation District has a program called the Low Volume, Dirt, and Gravel Road Program that provides funding for projects like this one. The YCCD is very interested in engaging with Lower Chanceford Twp on this project, and others like it. We will continue to encourage the township to engage with YCCD and pursue the replacement of this culvert.

COOPERATIVE NURSERY REPORT


This winter has been for the most part mild with very little snow. That has allowed the raceway water temperature to remain relatively mild. The 8000 brown trout enjoyed the milder water by feeding steadily through January and February. Even the size of the brown trout is just under 9 inches, which is exceptional for this time of the year. Reminder, the stocking of our trout will begin in March and run through early May. If you want a schedule and/or would like to help stock the trout, contact Fred Wilt at 717-309-8098.

Finally, this is an update on the stream section below Woodbine. Joe and Linda Koepper have been very co-operative with us regarding their property. In the fall we put in an additional pathway leading from James Cooper's property to the open field where it joins with the existing path to the trestle bridge at Orson Run. Fishermen are not to use the rail bed or the trestle bridge as a walking path until they have crossed Orson Run which by the way is closed to fishing. Then climbing up to the rail bed and using it to continue downstream is permitted. Elderly and handicap are permitted on the rail bed and bridge as needed. Also, people continue to bring their dogs to this area. The signs says, "NO DOGS"! People don't read the signs or just ignore them. We need to remind them to "READ THE SIGNS" and then obey the guidelines listed.

MCTU VOLUNTEERS BRING IT

Muddy Creek Trout Unlimited conducts business and improves the health of the watershed through an all volunteer basis. Our mission is to Conserve, Protect and Restore the Muddy Creek watershed for future use. While our membership is approximately 200 people we have been able to make some amazing progress in and along Muddy Creek regarding our mission statement and the efforts to promote coldwater conservation. Each year we must log volunteer hours of the chapter to Trout Unlimited in Arlington Virginia.

During the 2021 - 2022 fiscal year the members of MCTU Chapter #575 volunteered 3,316 hours in total as a group. This was our biggest year in the past decade regarding volunteer hours and much of it went to tree plantings of riparian





buffers along the stream and its tributaries. Many more hours were contributed by individuals for managing the nursery, caring for and feeding the trout on a daily basis, inspecting and taking care of the incubators on the tributaries, and doing various outreach opportunities such as the Women on the Fly event, One Fly Competition, Landowner Appreciation Event, Red Lion Street Fair, and the Cabin Fever Fly Tying Event.

Throughout the last ten years Muddy Creek TU and its members have volunteered nearly 23,500 hours of time toward our mission. TROUT IN THE CLASSROOM UPDATE



Although it has been an abnormally snowless winter and warmer than average, the winter months are an exciting time for students in our TIC classrooms and their teachers. As a brief reminder, MCTU is again sponsoring and supporting five classrooms across three school districts. These districts include Dallastown, Eastern York, and Red Lion and provide opportunities for over 500 students across our local communities to experience trout, their life cycle, and the importance of cold water conservation. As we look toward the spring months the kids in these classrooms are actively monitoring water chemistry parameters such as ammonia, nitrite, and nitrate levels as well as temperature and even dissolved oxygen. Students are also doing daily equipment checks on the tank, feeding the trout, and monitoring for any mortality.

As the leaves begin to change and the morning air feels brisk TIC teachers are beginning to prepare their rooms and aquariums for another year. Trout in the Classroom is a program made possible through the PA Fish & Boat Commission, the PA State Trout Unlimited Council, and your local Muddy Creek Trout Unlimited Chapter #575.

TIC provides students with the opportunity to learn about coldwater conservation through the raising of rainbow trout from eggs to fingerlings. During the timeframe of January to May students manage the tank, learn about trout life cycle, habitat for trout, and the importance of cold and clean water. These tasks and the learning activities that go with them culminate in the spring with the releasing of the trout. Some of the learning experiences across the schools involving TIC are art projects in the elementary classrooms, junior high students looking at stream comparison data, and high school students working on aquaponics with their trout tank.

In our Fall TIC Update, I brought to your attention the overall costs for starting up a Trout in the Classroom setup and the possibility of components running up against their usage limit of being effective. On Friday February 17th, a Fluvial tank filter ceased working at one of the tanks in the Red Lion Junior High. The tank was unable to filter or circulate the water. If this had continued throughout the weekend it is likely that there would have been a large mortality event in the tank. Luckily, the teacher noticed over their lunch period and was able to pick up a new \$199.99 filter system at Cape Horn Pets. This new

Fluval filter system was put in place before the end of the day and no fish mortality occurred. While this change was made with little disruption to tank life or learning it was an expensive purchase and the \$600 chillers would be a much larger purchase and take much longer to acquire. I bring these instances to your attention so that any donations sent to MCTU with a dedication in the memo for TIC will be used for this specific purchase.

Additionally, with five classrooms doing releases in the spring we are in need of volunteers to help coordinate some of the stations we organize for the event. If you happen to have your clearances and would like to help out please reach out to the chapter and we will keep you informed on the release day come the spring. Lastly, it was recently discussed at the annual PA Trout Unlimited Council meeting that they have now qualified to use EITC to help fund the Trout in the Classroom program. The Earned Income Tax Credit allows for tax credits to be applied to businesses that offer funding to educational outreach programs. This opportunity is a new development for PA Trout Unlimited Council. If you or someone you know owns a business and would like more information on how your business could help fund Trout in the Classroom please reach out to Dan Dellinger the TIC Coordinator for Muddy Creek Trout Unlimited. Overall, the TIC program is a great outreach opportunity to teach cold water conservancy and without the efforts of our teachers and your help it would not be possible. Thank you.
